Low lying areas are constantly threatened by floods. Thunderstorms delivering 1 inch of rain per hour are common these days. It is time we apply the CANWARN training and become vigilant by monitoring the Weather Channel, Environment Canada Alerts and the **CANWARN Net** on 145.190 MHz repeater. As individuals, we need to remain vigilant and ready for community scale emergencies.

On a festive note, **Canal Days in Port Colborne** from *August 4 to August 7*. NPARC will have a special event station operating during the festivities. Check the **NPARC web site** for more details.

The next special event is the **Ride for Kids**. This is a big event covering a large territory in the Niagara Peninsula and beyond for 3 consecutive days from *Friday August 18 to Sunday August 20*. Each day there are 3 circuits of various distances from 60 km to 240 km of cycling along country roads. **This may be our way to Help the Kids**. If you are interested in participating as a radio operator volunteer, I encourage you to **read on** in details the information given in these sites. 

Explanation of How a Radar Operates:

Radar is a vital tool for weather forecasting. Environment and Climate Change Canada currently operates over 30 radars from coast to coast. As part of the ongoing radar renewal projects, many of these radars will be upgraded and new radars installed. These upgrades will allow meteorologists to produce more accurate weather warnings and forecasts.

Each radar sends out pulses of “electromagnetic energy”, which encounters precipitation targets such as rain droplets, snowflakes and hail. The returned energy from the radar is then processed and turned into a variety of weather products such as the standard color radar image, which depicts precipitation intensity. Doppler radar imagery allows meteorologists to more accurately forecast summer tornadoes, winter freezing rain and wind shear for aviation safety during take-off and landing. Radars are key in supporting Environment and Climate Change Canada’s mandate to inform Canadians, keeping them safe and able to plan and adapt to our diverse spectrum of weather as well as minimizing the potential for property damage.
